Fiji project

I have visited Fiji twice so far this year for the EARS Inc. project, ably assisted by volunteers. There are 17 special and inclusive schools and one Vocational Training Centre in Fiji. We have been assisting our partner organisation Frank Hilton Organisation (FHO) to conduct hearing screening in the special schools. This is the first time many of these specialneeds children have had their hearing tested, even those who are in the deaf school.



From April 2017 to April 2018, FHO Audiology has visited 14 special schools and one district school in the Central, West and Northern districts. We have also conducted repeat visits to 6 of these schools to screen students who were not present or did not have consent during the initial visit.

Of the collective school roll of 1019, 964 of these schools' students have been screened by the team. The team was also able to screen 241 outpatients whilst on these projects.

62% of the children screened within special schools were identified as having a hearing loss, or with or at-risk of ear health issues that may contribute to hearing loss. It is easy for these children to be misdiagnosed as having ADHD or mild autism, learning disabled, or speech and language delayed.

Mild to severe permanent hearing losses in children can be hard to detect as they appear to respond to many sounds. These children however are not able to hear clearly and therefore don't pronounce words clearly.

Temporary hearing losses due to infections or wax blockages can causes a fluctuating hearing loss. These children often fail to learn well as they miss vital information on days they are not hearing as well. If a child with learning difficulties suffers from ear infections or excess wax, it will make their learning difficulties appear to be worse. In the 14 special schools screened so far, we found 49% (N=469) of the children had an ear pathology at the time of screening. During our visits the ENT surgeon, Dr Oh,

who is a volunteer with the Korean International Corporation Agency and currently attached at the Colonial War Museum Hospital in Suva, joined the FHO team at six schools. He examined and treated 157 students for middle ear pathology and ear wax removal and saw 25 outpatients.

So far, 163 special school children who were suspected of having a significant hearing loss have attended the clinic for full assessment. FHO reimburses transportation cost to schools and individual parents for the trip to the clinic, as well as refreshments or meals where necessary. 48 students have been fitted with hearing aids in both Hilton Special School, Hilton Early Intervention Centre and Gospel School for the Deaf. The team has diagnosed permanent hearing loss in 16 special school students and 8 outpatients who will be fitted in term 2 (May-August) of 2018.

Alongside this program we have been training teachers, raising community awareness and increased the experience of our trainee audiology assistants as they have developed better otoscopy, tympanometry and otoacoustic emission skills. Work on data collection and follow-up of all patients has been important aspect of their training and development. Overall this program has been an amazing success and demonstrated to the Fijian government that hearing loss and ear pathology is present in more

children than previously thought.

ABC HCTC coming of age

For the first time since 2010 when Peter and Rebecca Bartlett arrived in Malawi and set up an audiology service at African Bible College (ABC) in Lilongwe, there are no expatriate audiologists at ABC. Ironically, that's something to celebrate, as the ABC Hearing Clinic and Training Centre (HCTC) is still open for business and every month is looking after dozens of people with their ear and hearing health concerns. ABC HCTC now has seven clinical staff – each with their own areas of responsibility, an office administrator and an earmould maker. They work well as a team and are committed to providing a high quality service at the Clinic and in more remote locations.

Following the departure of the Bartletts in 2016, Helen Brough (UK audiologist), Lois Grant (Australian audiologist) and husband Dr Ian Grant (Australian veterinarian and community development project manager) expanded the ABC HCTC's range of services in 2017/18 with the introduction of vestibular (balance) assessment and rehabilitation, neonatal hearing screening and early intervention rehabilitation. They also provided the staff with ongoing clinical and administrative supervision,

stakeholder advocacy and systems support. We thank Helen, Lois and Ian for the incredible service they all gave to the EARS Inc project in Malawi, and their ongoing commitment to the cause since they have returned to their respective countries.

In December 2017 for a preparation trip and in January 2018 for an outreach trip, Peter Bartlett returned to Malawi to work with the ABC HCTC team on providing hearing devices donated by Hear The World Foundation. The team was rather busy during the 3-week outreach trip ...

People fitted with devices: 115
Devices fitted: 186

These outreach visits were done in partnership with Save The Children in Mzimba South and Lilongwe districts, and Malawi Council for the Handicapped (MACOHA) in Dowa and Ntchisi districts. A further outreach in February was conducted with World Vision in Dedza district. The importance of working with community-based networks through experienced organisations cannot be overstated given the importance of follow up of patients and the ongoing maintenance of the devices and supply of batteries.

What's Next?

Although our ABC HCTC team does a great job, apart from University of

Manchester graduate Fletcher Chisalipo, the audiology training of the ABC graduates is not recognised in Malawi.

The ABC Bachelor of Science in Audiology program was accredited by the Medical Council of Malawi in September 2016 but is yet to be accredited by the National Council for Higher Education (NCHE), so we have had to suspend training the new cohort of six students, which would allow us to include the previous students.

Planning a trip?

Rebecca Bartlett will be in Malawi May/ June to support the team and, with the hope of the BSc(Aud) being registered by NCHE in June, prepare for the new academic year which starts in August.

Peter Bartlett, Helen Brough and EARS Inc. President David Pither and Board member Wesley Ong will visit in October prior to the Coalition for Global Hearing Health conference and World Congress of Audiology in Cape Town.

Peter Bartlett is planning on another outreach trip in January 2019.

To continue our on the ground support of the ABC HCTC team and training program we urgently need more expatriate audiologists to go to Malawi.

A Year to Remember

In 2017, Australian audiologist Lois Grant and her husband Ian spent one year supporting the work of EARS Inc. and the ABC Hearing Clinic and Training Centre (HCTC) in Lilongwe Malawi. We asked Lois to share some highlights.

Helen Brough (audiologist from UK), Ian and myself had an amazing year in Malawi. Whenever we think about stories, we think of special people we met and worked with.

Newborn hearing screening program

One highlight of our time in Malawi was the newborn hearing screening work that began during the year. With Helen's high level of skill in paediatric diagnostic audiology and my background in early intervention and family-centred support, we were ready to take up this new opportunity. We knew this was something that Peter and Rebecca Bartlett wanted to see begin, and with new equipment for baby hearing screening donated by Hear The World, the pieces all fell into place and we could see God's hand in this.

Malawian staff at the ABC HCTC quickly became proficient with the screening and involved in rolling out the program at the ABC maternity unit as well as trying a project at local hospitals, although there were some challenges along the way. It was rewarding to see our staff and the ENT staff at the local hospital work together to begin some newborn hearing screening at the hospital. HCTC staff members, Alinane and Kamuzu, provided training and technical support. The first baby was being fitted with hearing aids by Tiwa just as we finished our year and we look forward to seeing the difference that early identification and intervention may bring to the children and families of Malawi.

Student connections

When we think of highlights, our thoughts go to the group of young Malawian students who met for Bible study and prayer in our house each week. Although not directly related to Audiology, the times of laughter, sharing, studying the bible, praying and support were some of the most rewarding and special times that God gave us in our time in Malawi.

lan was also involved in teaching (Community Development and Veterinary Science at different places as well as Biology in the ABC Audiology Degree program) so there were many opportunities to spend time with students.

We felt privileged to follow on from Peter and Rebecca and all they had achieved in the previous six years with support from EARS Inc. We pray that others will share in the work and vision over the coming years, especially the opportunity to mentor and encourage the Malawians there. There is also the ongoing challenge to have the new degree course fully recognized in Malawi, as well as future work in the health sector there. Lots of need and scope for more volunteers!

EARS Honour Roll

We want to acknowledge the many organisations and individuals who have contributed significantly to the hundreds, possibly thousands of people in developing countries who are hearing better and have a better quality of life.

- **Technical experts:** Ian Whittle has provided volunteer calibration services in Malawi as has Nick Kourtis in Fiji and Paul Flynn in the Dominican Republic. Paul ran a repair and calibration course in the Dominican Republic. In Papua New Guinea, Mark Fry is still busy arranging the assembly of the sound booth donated by Rotary in Morwell and Knox.
- Allied health professionals: We now have speech pathologists and professionals from other disciplines who are joining us on the field which means we are involved in providing a more wholistic service.
- Donors: Many individuals have donated funds to EARS, including my clients. Several audiologists and audiometrists
 send us second-hand hearing aids and equipment and we are now receiving money and old aids from the EARS donation boxes.
- **Prayer:** Jim Thompson and now Jan Bebbington have led our prayer team. Prayer is fundamental to what we do, as we serve in Jesus' name.

Learning to Learn and Live

During her time with the Bartletts in Malawi in 2017, Marg Anderson (EARS board member) visited a small school for hearing impaired and deaf students. With help from her church, she is sponsoring a vocational program at the school.

The small school at Bandawe teaches hearing impaired students of all ages. Malawi is among the world's poorest countries, so vocational skills are as important as regular education. Teacher

Jacob Mvula says the past year was a busy one. The children received training in tailoring and knitting, and have worked on 50 desks for another school in their carpentry lessons.

The school has tried from time to time to grow vegetables, but it is a hot, dry place, and it is hard to set up a garden with enough shade to protect the plants from scorching and marauding goats. They need help to start a vegetable garden and

to convince the staff of the value of maintaining it. Anyone want to spend a year setting up a garden at the school?

They are raising chickens to eat and sell, managing to make enough profit to buy the next batch of chicks and feed them. One girl with learning difficulties seems to enjoy being in charge of the hens.

The school faces many challenges, as basic as feeding the children, a lack of teaching and learning resources like textbooks, shortage of classrooms and housing for their teachers, and ceilings need repair. The older children need light to be able to study and do homework but their solar lights were stolen when the night watchman died.

Despite the difficult circumstances, the children are doing well. At the end of last year, nine students out of 13 who sat for the National Examination were selected by three different secondary schools. A credit to their faithful, dedicated teachers.

Sound booth finally has a home in PNG

Mark Fry has made two trips to Papua New Guinea to organise the removal of the sound booth donated by Knox and Morwell Rotary Clubs a few years ago. The booth has been moved from Mt Hagen Hospital (long story) to Goroke, but some of the pieces have been stolen along with the insulation and fittings. Mark will spend four weeks reconstructing what's left inside a shipping container with several pallet loads of supplies we have shipped to the site. A shelter should have been constructed by the time he arrives later in May.



WHAT'S IN S.T.O.R.E.?

According to World Health Organisation (WHO):

- 466 million persons in the world have disabling hearing loss (6.1% of the world's population)
- two thirds of those with severe to profound hearing loss live in developing countries
- 60% of WHO Member States reporting on their capacity to provide hearing healthcare, had less than 1 audiologist per million population; 81% in the African Region, and
- only 41% have facilities for training audiologists; 20% in the African Region.

The gap between demand and supply in developing countries is compounded by a range of issues including poor public awareness of hearing loss and the benefits of hearing devices, a lack of accessible quality audiology services and practitioners, and the cost of hearing devices. With encouragement from WHO, governments are increasingly developing National Ear and Hearing Healthcare plans to address the hearing needs of their citizens.

For 20 years, EARS Inc. has supported and resourced audiology programs in several low and middle income countries and has developed, through observation and experience, the **S.T.O.R.E. framework**.

- SERVICES Establishing a flagship hearing clinic
- TRAINING Structured and intentional programs for local staff and/or students
- OUTREACH Regular, strategic, clinical visits to those who cannot travel to the hearing clinic
- **RESOURCES** Personnel, equipment, inventory, facilities, utilities, intellectual property, partners
- EVALUATION Before, during and after projects



At the 2018 biannual Audiology Australia conference in Sydney in May, Peter Bartlett presented a poster outlining the S.T.O.R.E. framework with examples from his experience developing the African Bible College Hearing Clinic and Training Centre in Lilongwe Malawi, a tertiary-level audiology facility offering a comprehensive range of clinical services and devices, training and outreach.

With an annual Gross National Income per capita of US\$320, economically Malawi is one of the poorest countries in the world. The success of the EARS Inc. Malawi audiology service and training program demonstrates that it is difficult but not impossible to delivery quality hearing care despite seemingly impossible circumstances.


